# **HOLY SPIRIT FETE**

The 2015 Fete Committee has had a number of changes since last year. # SPIRIT MAGIC BASKETBALL CLUB

The following outlines a brief description of the Spirit Magic basketball Clubs' year in review.

The recently commenced Winter season has seen membership numbers at near record numbers for the second season in a row, rounding out at just under 400 players. Whilst such growth is obviously a positive for the club, it does also introduce challenges around finding volunteers to coach teams (particularly at the older age group levels), and acquiring enough good quality court space for training. In regard to training venues, the last 12 months has seen us secure the Aquinas College gym on Tuesdays evenings as an ongoing venue — good quality courts with enough spare court space to allow for some further membership growth.

The year also saw a significant growth in the number of people joining our committee, peaking at 13 at one point during the last 12 months. Significantly at a committee level also, the year saw the ushering in of myself as the new president of the club, relieving Howie Sykes after 5 years of hard work in the position.

A couple of other noteworthy events during the year were the Parents Dinner @ the Ringwood Bowls Club, a successful evening attended by some 80 odd parents, and the Vinnies xmas hamper appeal where some \$500 was raised through our 49 teams ultimately being used to fund hampers and gifts for 4 needy families in the area.

The challenges in the year(s) ahead will continue to revolve around encouraging more volunteers to take up coaching and enticing those already coaching to 'stick with it' especially as their kids move into the older age groups. Additionally and importantly, the upskilling of these new and existing volunteer coaches also looms as a significant challenge going forward.

# LITURGY TEAM

The Holy Spirit Liturgy Team is a small and dedicated group. Several members are also choir members. Whilst these roles go hand in hand, it does also create some "conflicts of interest" for major occasions, as those members are not available to assist during the Masses. However, we do manage to recruit helpers, often with a tap on the shoulder before Mass begins, to get us through the liturgy.

As a team, we meet to discuss, prepare and co-ordinate special Masses, (including introductions, Prayers of the Faithful, reflections, etc.), Forgiveness Rites, flowers for Mothers' Day, Chocolates & bookmarks for Fathers' Day. We prepare the church for various occasions - changing the altar linen for the appropriate liturgical season, putting up relevant banners, decorating the church and preparing the foyer with artwork, messages etc. Many Saturday mornings there will be a bevy of activity going on, attending to the small details which can make a liturgical celebration so much more meaningful, i.e. altar cloths & banners being ironed, or creating a 'focus' near the sanctuary which reinforces the theme of the Mass.

I'm sure you all would have noticed the constant changes to the church environment over the Easter period. This is a huge effort from the team and the many parishioners we "recruit" to assist, and to those people we say "Thank you, we couldn't manage it with out you". Special thanks need to go to Jocelyn D'Souza, Marita North-Coombes, Kerry Haddow, Lawry Cecconello, Sue Wallace and Shirley Graham, who, along with the other Liturgy team members, co-ordinated the various Easter celebrations. Also a huge thanks to the choir – many hours of rehearsal go into the Easter Triduum and it just wouldn't be the same without their contribution.

We are always looking for new ideas and several members of the team regularly attend workshops run be the Archdiocese specifically to glean new ideas and resources which we can use in our Parish celebrations. These workshops are often run on a Saturday from 9am - 4pm, usually

before Advent and Lent, however, there are also other times when an opportunity is presented, and someone will go along.

Our numbers have declined over the past few years, with some members moving away from the parish, or in some cases, life style changes which have meant members are not able to continue. We are all getting older too, which limits our ability to climb ladders etc. We have been fortunate to have great support from the likes of Lawry Cecconello, Silvio Volombello & Don Schroder, or often the men involved in Church set up, who often do the climbing & fastening or hanging for us.

At this point we need to reiterate our plea from 12 months ago! We need new members to join us. We would love to have new ideas to re-invigorate our liturgies, so if any one is thinking that they might like to help out, please don't hesitate to ask! # ROSARY GROUP/PRAYER FOR PRIESTS

# **CHILDREN'S LITURGY**

The Children's Liturgy program has continued over the last year on both Saturday nights at 6pm and Sundays at 10.30am during school terms.

There are 18 current leaders who are all parents or adolescents in our parish. We have had two new leaders start this year and couple who shared a leadership role who have left the roster due to other commitments.

With the help of Michelle Sherriff we have had a number of Grade 6 children preparing for their Confirmation come along recently and assist the leaders. This has been a rewarding experience for everyone involved. We also have a Year 7 student about to join our roster to assist.

There is an average of approx 12 children attending each Children's Liturgy session. The numbers are increased when RCIC students undertaking their program as they are encouraged to attend Children's Liturgy. We have had some very successful large nights with 30+ children when special masses are on such as the rite of acceptance for Confirmation and Communion. The Sports mass had 70+ children which we split into 2 groups. We still run a fairly normal Children's Liturgy program on these big occasions so that children who haven't attended Children's Liturgy before can have the experience of what it is like.

The coloured activity sheets are enjoyed by the children in addition to our usual meditation, reading, discussion and prayers. The Children also love listening to music. Most of all the children all love the feeling of being involved and included in our mass whether they get to carry the candle, children's cross, bible or being part of the Offertory procession.

The location for Children's Liturgy has been challenging over the last year. Firstly we were moved to the back room of the Community house due to their scheduling which was a little too far away and now that the Community House is now having renovations the rooms have not always been suitable or accessible. We have a temporary location back in our preferred front rooms of the old Community House and we look forward to this being a permanent home once the renovations are complete.

# HIGH SPIRITS/RCIC

I took over the role of co-ordinator of the High Spirits/RCIC program at the beginning of Term 3 2014; I really had no idea what I was getting myself in for!! It started off ridiculously busy and really hasn't eased off since! ©

July and August saw me preparing 8 children for the Sacrament of First Eucharist. This was celebrated at the end of August with the Holy Spirit school children. At the same time I also started the new RCIC program (Rite of Christian Initiation for Children) where I had 18 children enrol in the program. Our classes were held on Sunday mornings 9.15am-10.15am, followed by attending 10.30am Mass together where the children also participated in Children's Liturgy.

The children completed their Sacrament of Reconciliation in November and were able to complete their Rite of Enrolment at our Community Mass and Meal.

After breaking for summer holidays we then resumed classes again at the start of February. The initial plan was that the children would prepare for both First Eucharist and Confirmation at the same time and receive both of these at Easter time. However, after reviewing the amount of work to be covered and the lesson allocations, Fr Joe and I agreed that the current program would be too rushed for the children to be adequately prepared for both sacraments. So we changed the structure of the program so Term 1 was dedicated purely to First Eucharist preparation. The children received this sacrament on the weekend of April 18<sup>th</sup> and 19<sup>th</sup>. We then started our Confirmation preparation at the start of Term 2. Our class time changed to Saturday afternoon 4.45-5.45pm, followed by attending Saturday night 6.00pm Mass together, with the children continuing to participate in Children's Liturgy. As part of the Confirmation preparation the children also attended the Confirmation Reflection Day along with the Grade 6 Holy Spirit children at the Holy Cross Centre in Templestowe. This weekend the children will complete their RCIC journey by making their Confirmation.

Fr Joe and I have now decided to revert back to the previous way of running the High Spirits program, where all of our sacraments will be celebrated with the Holy Spirit school children.

I'd like to take this opportunity to thank all of the Parish staff who have been ever so supportive of me whilst I've tried my best to do this job. They have been so welcoming and accommodating, especially as I've often needed to bring my children into the Parish House with me, they have put up with copious amounts of biscuit crumbs everywhere and the sounds of Play School on the TV! Thank you also to the parishioners and school staff who have helped me along the way and have been most encouraging and helpful.

# **EVERGREENS**

Highlights over the past 12 months include:

# ST VINCENT DE PAUL SOCIETY

Our Society Conference continues to enjoy great financial & material support from the Parishes and Schools. We do not receive any government funding and derive our funds from our monthly \$2 collection, the poor box, donations and proceeds from our Vinnies shop in Ringwood. We have 22 Members and meet weekly to review and plan our visits to those who request assistance.

The vast majority of our assistance visits are to single parent families, people with physical & mental disabilities who are living in various levels of poverty in our community.

Over the 12 months we provided the following assistance to:

676 adults,
649 children in 457 home visits:Supermarket food vouchers - \$22,453
Donated food - \$10,600,
Purchased food - \$10,142
Fruit & Vegetable runs - 45
Bread runs - 45
Christmas hampers - 90

Members also do visits in South Melbourne where there is no local Vinnies Conference and serve meals at Ozanam House – a shelter for 60 homeless men.

# **Usage - Summary**

Now that we have two years history for the web site in its current form we can do some analysis to compare the sites usage between the year just passed and the year prior.

Key points are as follows:

- 1. In most cases usage has increased (Session, users, pageviews). However, pages / session and average session duration has decreased suggesting the site is less engaging.
- 2. Desktop (around 50%), Smart Phone (27%) and Tablet Usage (20%) is largely in the same ratio (I expected a significate decrease in desktop usage / increase in mobile/tablet usage)
- 3. Easter and Christmas remain the busiest periods for the website. Usage has increased on the peak days in each period by 45% and 29% respectively

The past twelve months have been steady in my role within our community. Home visits to those who are ill, ministering with Eucharist, staying for a chat and offering practical home help is a major part of my work.

Those who suffer bereavement are assisted with my time, parish resources and support to plan and execute funeral masses.

Regular visits to local nursing homes and spending time with the elderly and lonely is an important outreach action. Organising helpers to sit with lonely parishioners, driving them to doctor's appointments etc. is also a great outreach that we have been busy with the past year.

Spiritual and religious issues are often part of a quest for a deeper meaning of life and an understanding of self, so time is spent with parishioners to help them journey through their times of doubt.

Home visits to new parishioners, meeting their families and being made feel welcome in their homes is a wonderful part of my pastoral care work.

I receive great assistance from Fr. Joe for which I am very thankful for plus many generous parishioners who make weekly visits on behalf of the parish and also the Sunday Communion Ministers. I truly thank them all and pray often for them. If you see any needs in our parish that are not being addressed, please come in and have a chat with me and we will see what we can do about meeting the need.

# **HOLY SPIRIT SCHOOL**

On behalf of the school community of Holy Spirit Community School it is my pleasure to present the 2014/15 School Report. I wish to point out it would be impossible to explain all highlights/achievements in a limited space of time. This report should be read in conjunction with the Parish Pastoral Council reports I deliver each month.

### **Student Numbers**

August 2014 census showed 456 students enrolled. 2015 there are 453 students enrolled.

As with previous years in 2015 the school is divided into 18 classes:

3 x Prep (76)

5 x 1/2 (127)

5 X 3 / 4 (124)

5 X 5/6 (126)

### Staff

In 2015 Holy Spirit School employed 51 staff members

Teachers 14 full –time and 17 part-time. These numbers include the Principal, Deputy Principal, Student Wellbeing, Reading Recovery, Literacy and Maths,

Office staff – 2 full-time – Bursar and secretary

Student Support staff – 13, all part –time.

Specialist teachers 4 of Japanese, Library, Performing Arts and Physical Education, all part-time.

Counsellor -1, part-time.

In a number of classes we have shared teaching arrangements where two teachers take the class.

Positions of Leadership – Religious Education, Student Wellbeing Learning and Teaching, Maths, Literacy and Level Leaders. Within the above numbers we employed three graduate teachers.

# Fees and Levies:

Fees: 97.0% Levies: 96.00%

Follow up with non –fee payers continued in 2014/15.

# **School Improvements:**

The main works around the school were the construction of the garden surrounding the BBQ area, the artificially turfing of the Fr. Mogg oval and the placement of shade sails over the play equipment.

# **Academic Results:**

Data from sources such as NAPLAN (2014) show that Holy Spirit continues to provide a quality education. Our continual aim is to improve in all areas of the curriculum. Although our direct involvement in the CTLM project concluded we have maintained a working relationship with ACU and CEOM. As a school we outsourced an IT company, AHH Computer Tutor, to inservice students and staff alike. Religious Education continued to be central to all we did. Weekly 8:30 Masses (9:00 from April 2015), whole school Masses and sacramental programs. Social justice issues continued to be priority. Daily prayer and Christian meditation demonstrated our Catholic faith. We are proud to be a Catholic school.

**CEOM School Review** - The school has continued with the implementation of the 2013 CEOM Review with focus being feedback.

**Parent Committees** - School Board, Parents & Friends, Maintenance, Uniform Shop, OSHC – are valued and are empowered to fulfil their roles. We are also well supported with classroom helpers, sport & excursion helpers on a needs basis.

**School Parish Links** - A great sense of community exists between our School and Parish. The existing links continue to be very strong and highly valued. The cooperation is evident with the sacramental programs, Masses, visits by parish to the school, use of the Community Centre etc. The Parish dinners (3 in 2015, Prep classes only) organised by Marisa Smeed and Meagan Whitworth, continue to be an example of ways we strive to build community.

# **FINANCES**

2014 saw an annual surplus of about \$11,000 however in light of a late annual Insurance invoice of \$9,000, the real surplus was \$2,000. Thanksgiving donations fell away to \$175,000, a drop of \$9,000 on 2013. Our diversification of income, including rent and interest on term deposits and an excellent Fete result has helped to offset the drop but is not a complete offset. Progressive reduction in hard and soft costs over 2014 and previous years has helped to keep costs in control and judicious spending has helped achieve this outcome.

The Parish Management Committee's objective of increasing revenue is focused on a voluntary extension of the Thanksgiving program through the school community in order to raise extra donors. This program was prepared and will be executed in 2015 - bit slower than we would like. The Outside School Hours Care program runs as a non-profit operation and has been successful growing year over year. This year, they move out of the Community Centre and into their own buildings (ex NRCH). The renovations required will be fully funded by OSHC and they will assume full responsibility for the maintenance of the buildings. Furthermore they have offered to donate at least \$10,000 annually to the Parish. This is additional income for us. The Deanery Raffle that the Parish has been involved with for what must be over 30 years has been less and less supported each year and is difficult to manage. PMC has taken the decision to seek alternate revenue generating opportunities. The Parish Pastoral Council has taken up the challenge and in 2015 will run a Trivia Night to raise funds for the Parish. Well done Lisa Keedle and Don Schroder.

PMC has spent a lot of effort over several years to reduce variable costs and even fixed costs where possible without effecting the provision of services and maintaining buildings in reasonable if not perfect condition. In 2014, they started to look at reducing electricity costs by installing a Solar Power system. This seems wise in the light of threatening rises in electricity charges. Three quotes were obtained and these are being assessed. Changes in government support has complicated the analysis but it appears a 5 year payback on a \$7,000 investment can be achieved without considering rises in power charges. A decision will be made in 2015.

The Committee has a responsibility to ensure the proper management of the Parish resources and finances. This is implemented in the governance procedures under which the parish operates. In 2014, detailed financial reporting from the Fete Committee operations was sought and freely provided. This will be an annual reporting program. The PMC is very satisfied with the integrity of the Fete Committee's financial processes and procedures. PMC reviewed the storage and security of physical data, keys, registers and reports and installed cupboards and lockable units on the Parish Admin offices. The committee also reviewed the management of cash collections and introduced more stringent procedures for collection, storage and counting.

By way of maintaining and improving parish assets, the committee addressed issues with the floor in the Community Centre caused by condensation under the floor boards, recarpeted the Sanctuary and spent almost \$7,000 on a new video projection system. Thanks to the School for also providing funding towards this.

The Total Income in 2014 was \$242,400 which was down on 2013 at \$287,700. This however is not a true reflection. In 2014 the PMC changed the accounting of "cost charge out" items. These are services where the parish assumes a cost and then passes a charge on to one of our service subsidiaries. In these cases the accounting showed both expense and income. The new accounting approach takes these items out of the P&L so although the income is down, so too are the expenses. On the Balance Sheet the Cash has remained fairly stable and Long Service Leave Entitlement dropped significantly due to staff movements as expected.

In 2015 you will see that the committee is seeking to implement a number of the initiatives commenced in 2014.
